# Welcoming the Child

In today's gospel Jesus is instructing those who will follow on from him and carry on his work for future generations. He took a little child and said to the disciples, 'Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.' As we continue our journey through the Season of Creation, we are reminded of Pope Francis' words in Laudato Sí - On Care for Our Common Home, where he challenges us to reflect: 'What kind of world do we want to leave to those who come after us, to children who are now growing up?' (Laudato Sí, 160). In the context of the environmental crisis our world is facing, how are we welcoming the generations to come? Pope Francis does not hold back when referring to the challenges: 'We may well be leaving to coming generations debris, desolation and filth' (LS, 161). We know that climate change and the biodiversity crisis are driving so many problems in our world at present. 'Climate change is a global problem with grave implications: environmental, social, economic, political and for the distribution of goods. It represents one of the principal challenges facing humanity in our day.' (LS, 25). Yet our pace of consumption does not ease. Young people are standing up and calling governments and world leaders to account, rightly concerned about their future.

During the Season of Creation, we must pray for our world, and act. How can we restore our common home and ensure that our world is liveable for the generations who are coming after us? Can your parish explore becoming an Eco-Parish, setting up a care for creation team, turning church grounds in areas which promote biodiversity? There is so much we can do, and no action is too small. We must listen to the cry of the earth and the cry of our young people.

'The one thing we need more than hope is action. Once we start to act, hope is everywhere. So instead of looking for hope, look for action. Then, and only then, hope will come.' – Greta Thunberg.

## **AMBITION?**

Our scripture readings for this weekend seem to suggest that ambition is something of a 'dirty' word. It is condemned by Jesus and St. James. However, on closer examination, we come to realise that it is not ambition itself that is condemned but the wrong type of ambition. Ambition in itself is a good thing. The real question is: what are we ambitious about? Those who are consumed by ambition can often sacrifice too many things to attain the goal of success. They can end up neglecting family life, relationships, even life itself.

In our gospel we have a very good example of false ambition. The apostles fight among themselves over who would have the most important status and positions. Jesus aware that this type of false ambition only leads to conflict and division and is very damaging to the group, teaches them an important lesson. He reminds them that true greatness is to be found in serving others. The really great people, those often most fondly remembered, are not those who sought to further themselves and their own interests, but rather those who devoted themselves to furthering the interests of the community. The call to 'serve'is an invitation to use one's gifts and talents not for one's own selfish ends but for others. If we do so, we will help to build a better world.
